Guidelines on how to use UNICEF Finland HRBA presentations

The objective of these guidelines is to provide information on how to use human rights based approach (HRBA) training presentations.

Presentations

HRBA presentations are designed to capture the essential basic information needed for planning projects using this approach.

Introductory presentation gives a short standalone overview of the entire field of the HRBA and its main concepts. It is a shorter substitute to the main presentations 1 to 4 and not suitable for project planning on its own.

Presentations 1 to 4 dive deeper into core sections of the HRBA and form an entity that gives the learner good overall view about planning with HRBA.

Presentations are factual in orientation and include basic relevant information together with simplistic visualizations of important concepts.

Slides are accompanied with note pages that can be used to clarify some concepts with wider details and to help the fluency of the appearance.

Modification to context

Slide shows are arranged in a way that allows the presenter to modify the content to suit his/her needs and the context where the presentations are given.

Presentations are narrow and factual in orientation to make it easy to include additional material like case examples and pictures that are suitable to the case or audience in question.

Interactivity

Presentations contain questions to help to increase the interactivity and mutual learning process within the learning situations.

Additionally presentations have possible group exercises that can be used to concretize the learned through practical activities.

Time estimates for the presentations and suggestions

The length of the presentations can be adjusted to your time constraints by controlling the amount of your added case examples and the interactive parts of the presentation. Especially the group exercises can be very time consuming depending on the context.

Introductory presentation can be held in single session of one to two hours.

For the presentations 1 to 4 it is recommended that at least full day is allotted. If all the exercises are held with enough time and context related material is added, it is beneficial to spread the workshop to two days.
